### Tax Payment Deadline — October 31st, 2019

Rate payers have until the above date to make payment in full for their tax assessment to avoid penalty as follows:

A penalty of 10% will be levied on any outstanding taxes after the above date.

A further penalty of 2% will be levied on all outstanding taxes on January 1st, 2020

## TIPPS (monthly automatic) PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS

How does the TIPPS Payment Plan work?

(Tax Installment Payment Plan)

Your taxes must be in good standing and must be paid in full for the current year.

An equal amount will be deducted from your bank on the 15th of each month. Starting each November, the monthly payment is calculated by dividing your most recent annual tax levy by 12 months. When the current levy is known, the pre-payments are subtracted and the new balance divided by the remaining months up to October 31st.

### **HARVEST SEASON**

Farmers and agricultural equipment operators should think ahead to establish safety procedures that prevent injuries. The key to prevent disasters during the harvest rush is to establish good habits and think through potential hazards.

### **HAZARDS INCLUDE:**

- Becoming entangled with the leveling or discharge auger in the grain tank
- Falling from the combine
- Contacting overhead power lines
- Being run over
- Contacting the knife, reel or stripper rotor
- Contacting the straw chopper or spreader
- Being trapped under the header or injured by the header falling from its transport trailer
- Being injured by the drive mechanisms
- Dust, Fires and Noise

### Several combine safety procedures include

- Set aside time to properly prepare the combine. Rushed repairs may lead to injuries.
- Conduct a safety check before taking to the field. Replace all guards and shields that may have been removed. Replace or repair all lights.
- Examine fields for hazards such as erosion washouts and other surprises that develop during growing season.
- Adjust and service the combine as directed.
- Always refuel the combine or tractor after it has cooled.
- Make sure there is suitable fire-fighting equipment available on the combine. The extinguisher should be regularly checked.
- Check hydraulic leaks carefully.
- Drive the combine only while you are alert and aware of your surroundings. Hours of operation can lull you into a hypnotic state. To avoid this, schedule a break for all workers every 2 to 3 hours or change jobs with someone for a while.
- Keep your distance from other vehicles and machines.
- Move combines from field to field only during daylight.
- To control dust and noise, always operate with the cab door closed. Exposure to high levels of grain dust causes ill health.

# ROAD SAFETY Uncontrolled Intersections: Some intersections have no traffic signs and no traffic signal lights. At these intersections you must yield the right-of-way to a vehicle on your right. Yield Sign: Yield the right of way to traffic not facing the sign and to all pedestrians waiting to cross within the intersection. ### **Cycling to School Safety Tips**

- Wear a helmet every time you ride—it's the law for anyone under 18.
- Ride in the same direction of traffic.
- Use hand signals early when turning or stopping.
- Always stop at stop signs and red lights, at the edge of the road. For stopped school buses when their red lights are flashing, for pedestrians at crosswalks.

### **Driving to School Safety Tips**

- Follow the school zones traffic rules.
- Stop at crosswalks and intersections.
- Enter and exit school zones slowly and carefully
- Do not speed.

### Walking to School Safety Tips

- Practice good role modeling by walking with your child and showing them road safety rules so that they can develop good habits.
  - Teach your child to use their eyes and ears. Always stop, look and listen, even if there is a crossing guard or signs.
    - Stop and check that all vehicles in every lane can see you and make eye contact with the drivers. Wait until drivers have stopped before crossing the road.
- Listen to oncoming traffic and be alert. Distractions, even talking while walking, can put children in danger.
- Walk, don't run.



### **Fire Safety in Dry Conditions**




Hot and dry conditions persist in Alberta. The office of the Fire Commissioner is reminding you to be aware and practice fire safety. Prepare for the threat of wildfire is a shared responsibility. You can do your part.

### **WILDFIRES**

Here are some important tips on how to do your part:

- <u>Dispose</u> of debris and lawn clippings to reduce fuel for the fire.
- <u>Clear</u> leaves from roofs, under your deck & porches.
- <u>Remove</u> flammable materials within 10m of your home's foundation (ie. Wood piles).
- <u>Prune</u> trees so the lowest branches are 2 to 3 meters from the ground.
- RESPECT FIRE BANS
- To put out a campfire; Soak it, Stir it, Repeat.
